Just Like a Movie

Aims

- To explore the thriller genre.
- To stimulate students to read the book.
- 1 Put the word 'blurb' on the board and ask students if they know what it means. Show them the backs of a few books and point out the blurbs. Ask students to read through the five level 1 reader titles and match them to the blurbs from the backs of the books (next page).

Answers: 1 c, **2** a, **3** d, **4** e, **5** b

Alternative: You can make this activity a little more active by giving half of the students a title and the other half a blurb. Each student has to find his or her other half as quickly as possible by moving around the room.

- 2 Elicit types of story from the students. Make sure you get the following genres on the board: romance, comedy, detective story, thriller, adventure, science fiction. Elicit or give brief explanations of the terms. Ask for examples in each category.
- 3 Tell students that they are going to read *Just Like a Movie*. Show them the front cover and elicit ideas and vocabulary (e.g. get married, wedding). It looks like it could be a romance, a love story. Ask students to think about the title, *Just Like a Movie*. What usually happens in love stories in the movies? Ask them to read the blurb again and the extracts (next page).

Ask students: Is it a love story? (partly). Do they think the ending will be happy or sad?

Elicit the fact that it is actually a thriller. It's a story that tells an exciting story about a murder or crime. Ask students which words in the extracts suggest this? (police, killer, dead) Ask the students if they have read other thrillers and, if so, which ones. Did they enjoy them? Why? Why not?

4 Put the blurb from the back of the book up on the board or overhead.

'Brad Black likes the movies. He goes every weekend with his girlfriend, Gina. They are happy, but they have no money. Then Brad has an idea and thinks that real life can be just like the movies – and that's when things go wrong.'

Put the students in groups of three or four and ask them to come up with five ways that Brad could get money. You can give them some ideas to get going: e.g. he robs a bank; he gets a better job; a rich relative dies.

Ask the group spokespersons to share their ideas with the rest of the glass.

- **5** Tell students they are going to read the first chapter of *Just Like a Movie*. Ask students to read the true/false statements below and check vocabulary. Once they've read the first chapter, ask them to note whether the statements are true or false.
 - **a** The story happens in Canada.
 - **b** Brad's girlfriend is a nurse.
 - c Brad met his girlfriend at the cinema.
 - **d** They met in the summer.
 - e Brad is very rich.
 - **f** He works as a handyman.
 - g Brad and Gina fall in love.
 - **h** Brad wants to live in London.

Ask students to read and answer individually, then check in pairs, then as a whole class.

Answers: a T (Toronto), **b** F (teacher), **c** T, **d** F (it was October), **e** F, **f** T, **g** T, **h** F (Paris)

Alternatives/extras:

- 1 If you have the recording, you can play the first chapter to them once you've checked the answers.
- **2** You can do this as a listening exercise, instead of as a reading.
- **6** Finally, ask the students what happens at the end of the chapter and what they think will happen next. If you have the books, hand them out and start reading.

Optional extras: Ask students to look at only the pictures from the first chapter. They can use the pictures to predict the story of the chapter before reading.
