‘The Prince is in Penang now,’ says Naylor.



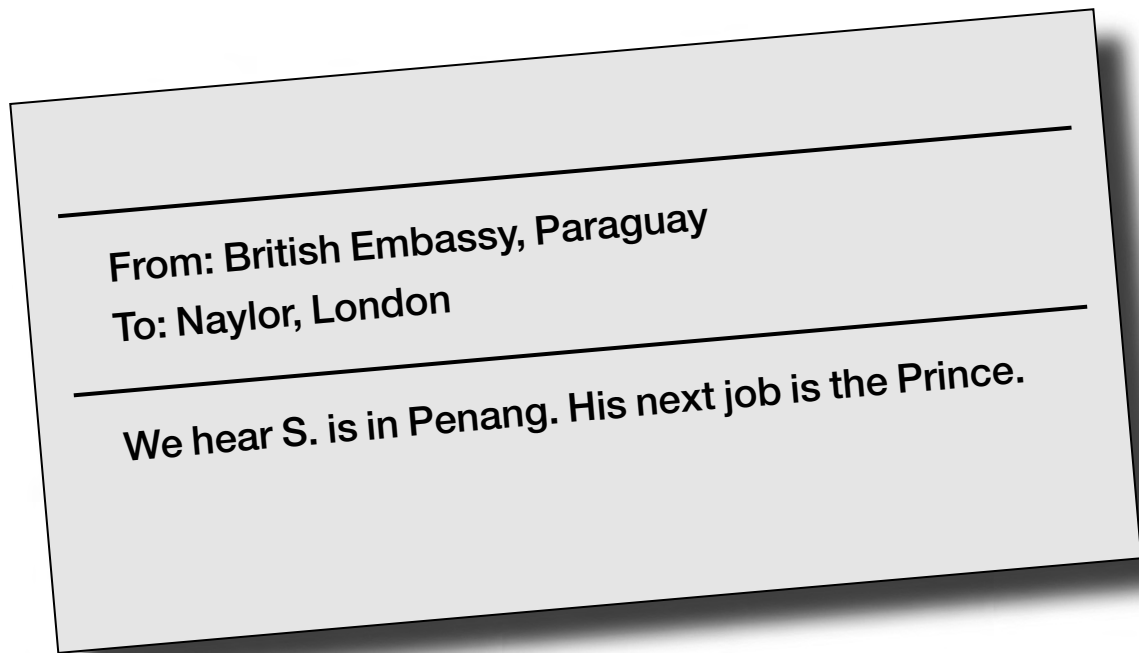


Naylor puts a photo in front of Munro.
